Pushing Energy Efficiency

Daniel C. Esty, professor of environmental law and policy at Yale University's law school and an author of *Green to Gold*, about how companies are using environmental strategies to compete, told those attending the meeting that he could guarantee that "absolutely everyone here is underinvested in energy efficiency."

Any efficiency calculations older than three weeks were outdated, he said, and he urged administrators to seek efficiencies in logistics and not just in the more traditional areas of energy conservation. He also argued that strong sustainability policies at colleges would be key to attracting and keeping top faculty talent and recruiting students.

Sustainability Efforts

In a session on how to "Grow a Culture of Sustainability," four community college presidents told how they have integrated greener practices into college operations. Sometimes that means overcoming resistance. Kathleen Schatzberg, president of Cape Cod Community College, said that when the college turned regularly mowed lawns into meadows, some on the campus complained that they looked unkempt or worried about the effect on those with allergies. Signs that said the unmowed areas were being returned to natural Cape Cod grasses and wildflowers helped fight those public-relations problems, she said.

Other innovations there have included solar-powered trash compactors in public areas so trucks don't have to circle as often to clean out sidewalk trash cans, patterns of recessed and protruding bricks in the sides of buildings that increase shadows and reduce cooling costs, and a wind turbine. Indeed, Ms. Schatzberg encouraged colleges to seek out grants: Her institution, she said, has gotten nearly \$2.7-million to support sustainability efforts.

Diana J. Van Der Ploeg, superintendent and president of Butte College, in Oroville, Calif., said she has had 5,700 solar panels installed on 3.5 acres. The panels produce one-third of the institution's electricity, she said. The institution hopes to be "carbon neutral" by the year 2015.

Energy service companies are also mentioned as a way to implement energy saving initiatives without expensive upfront costs since they allow institutions to pay for the installation of energy-efficient technology through future savings in utility costs rather than upfront payments.
