The ACUPCC continues to grow with 4 more institutions signing on since the last digest; presently, we stand at **518** institutions, just over halfway to our goal of 1,000 signatories by the end of 2009! The ACUPCC now represents more than 4.1 million students in 48 States!

The Clinton Climate Initiative and the ACUPCC are partnering to exponentially increase the number of large-scale energy saving retrofit projects in campus buildings. Through this program, colleges and universities will dramatically reduce greenhouse gas emissions while lowering their energy bills, without dipping into their capital budgets or increasing monthly operating expenses.

David Shi, President of Furman University shares the story of his institution's journey toward a sustainable future. In the article Dr. Shi sets the context for sustainable development, and what should be, higher educations responsibility for providing the knowledge necessary to create a sustainable future.

7. AASHE Releases Draft of Campus Sustainability Rating System

AASHE has released the next draft of its rating system for sustainability in higher education called STARS (Sustainability Tracking, Assessment and Rating System). The release of STARS version 0.5 opens a public comment period that will last until May 9, 2008. STARS is designed to: help gauge the progress of colleges and universities toward sustainability in all sectors, from governance and operations to academics and community engagement; enable meaningful comparisons across institutions as well as benchmarking within institutions; create incentives for continual improvement toward sustainability; facilitate information sharing about sustainability practices and performance in higher education; and build a stronger, more diverse campus sustainability community. Over 90 colleges and universities are pilot testing STARS. They will provide feedback to AASHE throughout 2008 and inform the development of STARS version 1.0, planned for release in spring 2009. 8. Legislative Watch

o <u>3 University Leaders Testify in Senate to Limit GHG Emissions</u>

University of California at Berkeley Chancellor Robert Birgeneau, University of Minnesota at Morris Chancellor Jacqueline Johnson, and Yale University (CT) President Richard C. Levin recently testified at the U.S. Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works Hearing, "Examining Strategies to Reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions at U.S. Colleges and Universities." Each university leader discussed the important role of colleges and universities in battling climate change and the necessity for the federal government to enact legislation limiting greenhouse gas emissions nationwide.

• Senate passes one-year extension of renewable-energy tax credit

The U.S. Senate passed an extension of the renewable-energy production tax credit Thursday (4/10) as part of a bill intended to address the ailing U.S. housing market. The renewable-energy credit

provides a per-kilowatt-hour incentive for the first 10 years a renewable-energy project is in operation -- a credit considered to be a vital driver of clean-energy expansion. The credit is worth an estimated \$6 billion and will be extended for another year, through 2009, if the legislation makes it past the House of Representatives and President Bush. Homeowners and businesses will also be able to offset up to 30 percent of the cost of solar and fuel-cell equipment under the bill, and homeowners who install efficient insulation, furnaces, and windows will get additional credits. "It would be difficult for taxpayers to find an investment that offers a better return," said Melinda Pierce of the Sierra Club. "This package of incentives will pay us environmental and economic dividends for years to come."
